Road Salt is a Clear and Present Danger to the Lakes of Muskoka

Sign up for the Road Salt Summit in Gravenhurst this Saturday



In 2001, Environment Canada released a detailed five-year study on the environmental impact of road salt. They concluded that, at the current levels being used, salt was harmful to freshwater ecosystems, as well as soil, vegetation, drinking water, and wildlife

of road salt to clear roads and parking lots of snow and ice, has continued and in many cases, increased.

In September of 2020, Dr. Norman Yan PhD, FRSC stated the following in his report *The Road Salt Threat to Muskoka Lakes*: "Road salt represents a threat to the long-term health of the Muskoka watersheds. Lake Muskoka is holding at least 12,000 tonnes of road salt in its waters, and concentrations in Muskoka Bay have risen to levels that likely threaten its aquatic life."

Dr. Natalie Kim's scientific paper Wood Ash Amendments as a Potential Solution to Widespread Calcium Decline in Eastern Canada Forests, co- authored by Dr. Shaun Watmough from Trent University and Dr. Norman Yan from Friends of the Muskoka Watershed (FOTMW), reviews research on impacts of calcium deficiency on forests caused by decades of acid rain. Dr. Kim reviews the benefits of calcium and wood ash additions for forest health in eastern Canada.

Adding wood ash could improve forest health. Calcium deficiency is an environmental issue in areas of the Canadian Shield with shallow soil and a history of acid rain, but the application of household wood ash is making a positive difference. Muskoka is one such area, and ash addition could improve the health of the trees and possibly other life in the forests. To read more, follow the link below.
